What Is Smeg?

An Italian-based home appliance company, Smeg products are known for their retro aesthetic, namely their vibrant colors and streamlined edges. The brand, which was founded by Vittorio Vertazzoni in 1948, began as a metalworking company in Guastalla, Italy. As a nod to its roots, the company's name is an acronym: Smalterie Metallurgiche Emiliane Guastalla. Today, the third generation of the Vertazzoni family runs the business.

Though Smeg prioritizes style, its appliances are also designed with functionality in mind. For instance, the Smeg Citrus Juicer tops our Best Juicers of 2023 list, tying for first place along with Breville's The Juice Fountain Cold Plus.

Aside from juicers, Smeg makes other kitchen products, including toasters, kettles, and mixers, in addition to larger appliances such as fridges and ovens.



Smeg Citrus Juicer Review

Ranked #1 in Best Juicers of 2023 (tie)

The Smeg Citrus juicer earns the No. 1 spot in our Best Juicers of 2023 list, tying with the Breville The Juice Fountain Cold Plus. Ideal for those who just want to juice citrus – not vegetables – the Smeg extracts fresh juice from lemons, limes, oranges, and grapefruits. To enhance juice quality, the Smeg's strainer filters out pulp and seeds.

Professional reviewers tend to agree that the Smeg is easy to operate. Thanks to a built-in sensor, its 80-watt motor starts automatically once you press the sliced fruit onto the reamer. While manual juicers require you to squeeze the juice out of fruit by hand, electric juicers, like the Smeg, take the effort out of juicing.

Experts also mention this juicer's aesthetic appeal. It's compact, which is a plus for those with smaller kitchens, and it comes in a range of eye-catching colors that'll look good on your countertop.

Those looking to juice both fruits and vegetables should consider either a centrifugal juicer or a slow juicer. Some juicers can handle whole fruits, meaning you don't need to slice the produce as you do with citrus juicers, which saves prep time. On the other hand, slow juicers (also called masticating juicers) preserve nutrients better than high-speed juicers that generate heat.

What Comes With a Smeg Citrus Juicer?

The Smeg Citrus Juicer features:

- a dust cover
- a stainless-steel reamer
- a stainless-steel filter
- a juice collector
- a stainless-steel anti-drip spout
- a die-cast aluminum motor base with non-slip feet and built-in cord storage


The Smeg is equipped with an 80-watt motor that has a built-in-sensor, which initiates the juicing process once there's pressure on the reamer. For easier cleanup, the Smeg's anti-drip spout is designed to avoid spillages. Also, its reamer and filter are detachable and dishwasher safe.

How Much Does a Smeg Citrus Juicer Cost?

The Smeg Citrus Juicer costs \$189.95. The other juicers in our ratings range from \$90.96 to \$599.99. The Breville Juice Fountain Cold Plus, which ties with the Smeg for first place in our Best Juicers of 2023 list, has a price tag of \$279.95. While the Smeg sells for much cheaper, it's worth noting that it functions solely as a citrus juicer, while other models in our rankings, including the Breville, can tackle whole fruits, as well as vegetables.

The Smeg Citrus Juicer and the Breville Juice Fountain Plus both tie at No. 1. in our Best Juicers of 2023 list. Unlike the Smeg, the Breville is a centrifugal juicer, meaning it performs at a faster speed.


The Breville is a better choice for those who are interested in high-volume juicing. Its high-capacity juice jug can hold up to 70 fluid ounces and it has an extra-wide chute to reduce prep time. This juice extractor also features a large pulp container (3.4 liters), which allows you to make large quantities of juice without having to empty the receptacle often.

The Breville can pulverize whole fruits and vegetables. For the Smeg, which only caters to citrus, you must cut the fruit in half and press each part onto the reamer.

The Smeg, however, costs \$90 less than the Breville. It's also smaller in dimension, making it a better choice for those with limited counter space. Additionally, it comes in numerous color options, including black, cream, pastel blue, pastel green, pink, red, and white. The Breville is only available in brushed stainless steel.

Smeg Citrus Juicer vs. Mueller Ultra Power Juicer

At \$90.96, the Mueller Ultra-Power Juicer is the most affordable model to place in our Best Juicer of 2021 rankings. It costs \$98.99 less than the Smeg Citrus Juicer.

Typical of all centrifugal models, the Mueller uses a fast-spinning blade to chop both fruits and vegetables. It's equipped with two speed settings: a low speed for soft fruits like apples, grapes, and citrus fruits, as well as a high speed for harder fruits and vegetables (carrots, celery, beets, and kale, just to name a few).

The Smeg, an electric citrus juicer, only produces citrus juice. However, it outranks Mueller in our Best Juicers of 2023 list. While the Smeg ties for the top spot in our ratings, the Mueller ties with the NutriBullet Juicer Pro at No. 11.





How Do I Buy a Smeg Juicer?

Smeg sells its juicers through various distributors, including online platforms like Amazon and Wayfair. If you're more interested in an in-person experience, you can purchase Smeg juicers at major retailers like Best Buy, Kohl's, Bed Bath & Beyond, and Nordstrom, among others. Smeg juicers are also available at specialty stores such as Williams Sonoma, Crate & Barrel, and West Elm.

Smeg's website features a tool to help you locate nearby appliance stores that carry the brand's products.

Does Smeg Offer a Money-Back Guarantee?

Smeg doesn't offer a money-back guarantee as a manufacturer because it doesn't sell its products directly to customers in the United States. Instead, the policy for returns and exchanges varies depending on the retailer from whom you purchased the product. For more specific guidance, it's best to contact the store or website directly.

Does Smeg Have a Warranty?

Smeg products come with a limited one-year warranty. Among the other juicers in our ratings, this offering is standard.

Within a year of your purchase, Smeg will repair or replace your appliance or its defective parts free of charge. Keep in mind, this coverage excludes wear and tear, as well as any damage that results from misusing the product.

How Do I Use a Smeg Juicer?

Prior to operating the machine, slice fruit into halves. Then, lower the Smeg's anti-drip spout and place a glass beneath it. Since the Smeg is an electric juicer, it must be plugged into a power source. The unit doesn't have a power button. Instead, you press the sliced citrus on the cylinder-shaped reamer, which signals the motor to start spinning.

Once you're done juicing, remove the fruit from the reamer. This will automatically stop the motor. Lastly, close the Smeg's spout.

Compared to other types of juicers, citrus juicers like the Smeg are the easiest to use. While they're not intended to pulverize vegetables or whole fruits, they're designed with a single purpose: to extract juice from citrus.

How Do I Clean a Smeg Juicer?

It's recommended to clean the Smeg Juicer's die-cast metal motor base after every use. Once the machine cools down, wipe its surface with a damp cloth and mild detergent.

The Smeg's cover protects the unit from collecting dust when it's not in use. This piece – along with its reamer, filter, and juice collector – are all detachable and can be cleaned in the dishwasher, making for an easy clean-up.

Before you operate the juicer again, it's important to make sure these components are finished drying. It's also worth noting that these parts are made from stainless steel to prevent long-term corrosion.
