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Whether you're a casual wine drinker or a wine aficionado or fall somewhere in between, a good wine glass can elevate every sip.

But there are almost as many wine glass types as there are varieties of wine, so if you're searching for the best wine glasses, we narrowed it down for you. To find the best wine glasses, we compared dozens of options while considering design, materials, care, and price. We also tapped some of the top wine experts for their insights and pointers for choosing the best wine glasses.

These StandArt Machine-Blown Wine Glasses are a sophisticated and affordable choice for wine lovers seeking an exquisite tasting experience. This set of two is all-purpose and looks elegant enough for a special occasion bottle yet still sturdy enough for everyday use. The gently curved bowl is designed to open the wine's aromas and distribute them straight to your nose. The tulip shape of the bowl can enhance all types of wine from bold reds to delicate whites and even sparkling wines. Made in Austria, the lead-free crystal is formed from a single piece of molten crystal so there are no joints, seams, or glues, eliminating the need to treat them like they're fragile. The wine glass is strong but slim, and the rim is laser-cut and polished by a diamond wheel to give it higher resistance against impact, breakage, and chipping. It also makes sipping wine a smooth experience.

It's worth noting that these glasses are tall, which means the likelihood of being tipped over is higher, and it may be more challenging to store them if space is limited. The set of two glasses comes at a relatively affordable price for the quality whether you enjoy a daily glass or plan to use these for special bottles of wine. These glasses are dishwasher-safe, and Gabriel-Glas recommends powered detergent over liquid. It's also recommended to polish them dry when damp and still steamy.

Best Budget

Libbey Vineyard Reserve 12-Piece Party Set »

If sticking to a budget is your main concern, this set from Libbey, which includes 12 glasses, is an inexpensive but versatile option. Despite their

affordable price, the glasses feature an elegant, classic, and practical design that caters to both red and white wine drinkers. This set contains six merlot Bordeaux wine glasses with a wide bowl that brings out the robust flavors of your red wines, as well as six chardonnay Chablis glasses with a taller, narrower bowl for lighter, subtler flavors.

The rim of these glasses is a little thicker than you'll find on crystal glassware, and that can sometimes feel awkward when drinking. However, these pieces are durable with a solid weight; they don't feel overly fragile, unlike some crystal options. However, since they run a little big (especially the red wine glasses), storage space is something to keep in mind.

Crafted from lead-free glass, this set is dishwasher-safe for easy cleanup. If you do hand-wash, Libbey recommends filling a sink with warm, soapy water and holding the glass by the bowl to submerge it. A soft foam or microfiber brush may be necessary to remove stains from the bowl.

Best for White Wine

Riedel Vinum Viognier/Chardonnay Glasses »

This pair of wine glasses may look like an all-purpose set, but Riedel specifically shaped each to allow the development of white wines' flavors and aromas. The Vinum series is Riedel's bestselling glassware series, and it was the first varietal (wine type)-specific, machine-made glass on the market. The glass bowl shape is based on the character of the wine, and, because white wine doesn't need as much space to breathe as red wine, the bowl is smaller and narrower to preserve the delicate aromas and concentrate on the wine's qualities. This one is designed for more light- to medium-bodied wines like chardonnay, sauvignon blanc, Albariño, and pinot gris.

Like most of Riedel's lineup, these glasses are beautifully made without being too delicate. The design is sleek and elegant and feels comfortable in your hand. The stem length is about half the total height of the glass, creating a good distance between your hand and the bowl of the glass, which helps to keep the wine cool. Overall, this is beautiful, functional glassware without a premium price tag. Although these wine glasses are durable, some consumers have noted that the rim chips easily, which isn't surprising considering it's the thinnest part of the glass. That's why, even though these are dishwasher-safe, we suggest hand-washing.

Best for Red Wine

Founded in 1756, Riedel has been synonymous with wine glasses, as it was the first company to develop wine-friendly and varietal-specific stemware. Its Veloce collection is made from the same high-quality crystal as the rest of its glassware, but these are machine-made and mimic the look and feel of handblown glassware for a fraction of the cost.

These red wine glasses are light, delicate, and fine, which adds to the luxurious feeling of drinking from high-quality glassware. The rim is thin, amplifying your enjoyment when sipping from this glass. The diamond-shaped bowl is spacious, giving plenty of room to swirl and aerate (increase its exposure to oxygen) the wine, which is ideal for showcasing full-bodied wines, such as cabernet sauvignon, merlot, and Brunello because it allows the wines to develop intense aromas and flavors more quickly.

At nearly 10 inches, these glasses are on the taller side, and they're more fragile than other machine-made options. So although Riedel claims these glasses are dishwasher-safe, we'd err on the side of caution and hand-wash these.

Best Multipurpose

Zalto Denk'Art Universal Wine Glass »

Multipurpose, or universal, wine glasses are the Goldilocks of drinkware — the bowl isn't too big or too small, and the width of the mouth measures somewhere between the mouth of white and red wine glasses. In other words, it's just right. The Zalto Denk'Art Universal Wine Glass is excellent for sipping every kind of wine, from crisp, light whites to dry, medium-bodied pinot noirs and even to full-bodied cabernet sauvignons and zinfandels. The stunning handblown, lead-free crystal glass is incredibly thin and light, and its wide bowl and straight sides are designed to bring out the best aromas and flavors of each grape. The sky-high stem feels good in the hand, and it keeps the wine temperature from rising with your body heat. However, that stem can snap easily if you aren't careful.

Drinking from these glasses can bring enjoyment to casual drinkers and wine connoisseurs alike, and, despite feeling incredibly fragile, these Zalto wine glasses are dishwasher-safe. Nevertheless, most reviews recommend that you stick with gentle hand-washing followed by a quick polish with a microfiber towel. These glasses are sold individually or as a set of two, four, or six, and, while they're considered luxury stemware, they're adaptable, catering to multiple types of wine, which means fewer glasses to store in your cabinet.

Best Stemless

Schott Zwiesel Tritan Forte Universal Tumbler »

This set of six stemless glasses from Zwiesel are beautiful, durable, and break-resistant, making them ideal for everyday use. Made from titanium-based, lead-free crystal, these pieces resist scratching, breaking, or chipping. The flat base keeps them from tipping over, which is why they're perfect for parties and other get-togethers.

Stemless wine glasses should be easy to hold for a variety of hand sizes, and these are narrow enough for the smallest hands but don't feel fragile in larger ones. The rim is smooth so it sips comfortably. This is a "universal glass," which means the bowl enhances any type of wine. This is a practical and versatile choice if you don't have room for wine glasses designed for each style of wine.

These glasses are only 3.75 inches in diameter at their widest point, so the bowl doesn't offer much in the way of aeration for larger-bodied wines like a Burgundy or Bordeaux. Although these glasses are dishwasher-safe, handwashing is recommended because the heat of the dishwasher can make the glass cloudy.

Best High-End

Josephinenhütte Josephine No. 3 Red Wine Gl...

If you're a serious wine drinker looking to invest in high-quality special-occasion stemware, this is a beautiful option. Designed by sixth-generation glassmaker Kurt Josef Zalto, these are mouth-blown and handmade in Europe, and every glass is one of a kind. The modern design is extremely unique: The wide bowl is designed to act like a wine decanter for ample oxygen exposure so wines can more easily open and breathe.

About one-third of the way up from the stem, the glass indents (called "the kink"), and this is designed for a more concentrated wine aroma. Although the stem is long, it's incredibly durable. Paper-thin and incredibly light, these glasses feel like air, and sipping from the delicate rim makes it feel like

there's nothing between your mouth and the wine. These pieces are designed to work well with every wine varietal.

Josephinenhütte says the set is "dishwasher suitable," but it's recommended to hand-wash the pieces with a few drops of mild detergent and lukewarm water. The manufacturer also suggests that you never hold the glass by the base or only the stem. Instead, cradle the goblet in your hand with the stem between your index and middle finger.

You can buy by the glass or in sets of two, six, 12, 18, and 24, and, at \$90 per glass, these are a splurge. But if you're a connoisseur of high-end wines, the price may be worth it.

Best for Wine Tasting

Shopping for wine glasses can be befuddling because the choices are endless. How many glasses do you need? How many different types of glasses do you need? This collection helps narrow down those decisions for you. Ouverture is Riedel's "entry-level series" of wine glasses, and it's aimed at users who appreciate everyday wine but don't want to break the bank on expensive glasses.

Nevertheless, these are high-quality, lead-free crystal wine glasses. This collection contains 12 nonvarietal-specific glasses, which are excellent for sipping a variety of wines. There are three sizes – four red wine glasses, four white wine glasses, and four Champagne flutes – and the simple classic

style is versatile because it highlights a variety of wines in a single glass. They're thin-lipped like higher-end glasses, so drinking from them is enjoyable.

We like this because it's a modest collection of stemware for daily use, entertaining, or tasting wine. Each one is nicely balanced, and the affordable price makes them more accessible to consumers. These elegant glasses are machine-blown, and, like most wine glasses, these are dishwasher-safe, but consumers have noted that they're still fragile and recommend handwashing.

The Bottom Line

Whether you enjoy the occasional glass of wine or consider yourself a wine connoisseur, it's best to look for the sweet spot between price and functionality when purchasing wine glasses. The Gabriel-Glas StandArt Machine-Blown Wine Glasses are sophisticated, midpriced, and all-purpose wine glasses that are exquisite enough for special occasions but aren't too precious for everyday use. If you're serious about your wine, the Josephinenhütte Josephine No. 3 Red Wine Glass is a high-quality, elegant (and pricey) option worth considering. Overall, we found that you can easily

spend a small fortune on wine glasses, but there are plenty of affordable options that will allow you to sip and savor your wine just as well.

Things To Consider When Buying Wine Glasses

Material: The material you choose may depend on your budget. The most common materials are crystal and regular glass. Crystal is the material of choice for many brands because it can be formed thin and is durable. "The best material is crystal," says Jonathan Kleeman, executive head sommelier at Tom Sellers Story Group, which includes Michelin-Star restaurants. "It's more elegant to drink out of, and can give you a nicer experience," he says. Crystal is more refractive (in other words, sparkly), which is desirable when looking at wine.

Traditionally, crystal was made with lead to make it more durable – and some still is – but most brands use lead-free crystal, which is usually made with magnesium and zinc and offers the same strength and brilliance in a lighter glass without the health hazards. Not surprisingly, crystal is the most expensive option. Wine glasses made from glass tend to be thicker, which may not be as enjoyable to sip from as crystal. However, it's durable and nonporous so it won't absorb smells or stains. However, it's more affordable than crystal and is dishwasher-safe.

Thickness: The thickness of the glass doesn't contribute to making your wine taste better. "The thickness doesn't change the taste or necessarily the aromatics," says David Weitzenhoffer, founder of the wine store Community Wine & Spirits based in New York City, New York, and a long-time wine-industry expert. "It does have aesthetic appeal for many people," he continues. Kleeman agrees: "If you like wine, it's going to taste good out of any glass. We're talking more about preference. [A thinner glass] does make a difference in terms of a more elegant drinking experience."

Capacity: Red and white wine glasses vary in size and shape, but there are some standard sizes. Red wine glasses generally hold between 12 to 16 fluid ounces, and white wine glasses tend to hold 12 fluid ounces. It's worth noting, however, that a standard serving of wine is 5 fluid ounces. Wine writer and educator Eve Bushman

says that wine should never be poured beyond the widest point of the bowl – "This way, the wine drinker has room to swirl and capture aromas."

Shape: Wine glasses come in all shapes and styles. Whether your wine is red, white, or sparkling, the aromas play an important role in its character. When it comes to red wines, look for a glass with a large bowl, as this allows the wine to be exposed to more oxygen, helping the wine open up and "breathe." White wine glasses have a smaller bowl and opening, which is designed to preserve the aroma rather than let it breathe.

Stem: The stem on a wine glass doesn't just look pretty and elegant. It has a couple of functions. First, holding a wine glass by its stem instead of by the bowl of the glass prevents body heat from your hands from affecting the temperature of the wine. The stem also allows you to swirl your wine, which releases the unique aromas of each wine.

Stemless wine glasses have the same bowl shape as stemmed glassware, but, without the stem, they have a lower center of gravity, which makes them harder to knock over and spill. Stemless glasses are much easier to store because they can more easily fit in cabinets. They also fit into the dishwasher more easily and give off a more casual, modern vibe.

Care: Whether you sip from fancy stemware or enjoy your wine in more affordable glassware, it's important to care for your wine glasses. Stains from previous pours or residue from soap or detergent can alter the taste and appearance of your wine. Gently cleaning, polishing, and drying them after each use will keep your glasses in peak condition. Proper storage is also important. Bushman recommends storing fine, thin-rimmed wine glasses with their bowls up, which significantly reduces the chance of chipping when putting them away. It's also recommended to keep the glasses about a 1/2 inch apart, again to reduce the likelihood of chipping the glass.

To compile our list of the best wine glasses, we consulted various wine experts including David Weitzenhoffer, founder of Community Wine & Spirits; Jonathan Kleeman, executive head sommelier at Tom Sellers Story Group; and Eve Bushman, a

wine writer and educator who has a Level Two Immediate Certificate in Wine and Spirits from the Wine and Spirits Education Trust (WSET). These experts offered insights into the best materials, shapes and sizes, and what to look for when purchasing wine glasses. We also did a thorough analysis of some of the most popular and well-reviewed wine glasses out there.
